





Literacy:

Word Families

Today we are going to be learning about words from the 'at' word family. Words in the at word family all end in a t. Follow the link below to watch this video and join in. <u>Word Family -at | Phonics Song for Kids | Jack Hartmann - YouTube</u> Now have a look at the pictures below and 'have a go' at sounding out and writing each word. Remember they will all end with our new word family a t.



Challenge – Can you think of any other words from this family? Can you use one of your words in a sentence? Maybe someone at home could help you to 'have a go' at writing this sentence just like we do in class.

Have a look on Seesaw, we have created an **at word** family activity for you to

complete, listen to the instructions and this will help you to learn a little more about this word family. Handwriting It is really important that we practise the correct letter formation and orientation. Today we are going to focus on another of our 'curly caterpillar' letters the letter 'e'. We need to be really careful when writing this letter. We do not start at the top for this letter we start in the middle. So, we start in the middle, and go up and round at the top, all the way down and round and stop. 
Number bonds

Today we are going to continue learning about number bonds. Number bonds are **pairs** of numbers that can be added together to make another **bigger number**. Or inversely if you have a **big** number then you can break it down into **2 smaller numbers**, in lots of different ways. It is really important for Primary I to become confident with all their number bond facts within IO as this will help them to learn how to add and subtract bigger numbers with increasing accuracy and speed.

Look at our video on Seesaw and we will explain this to you a bit further.

We are now going to focus on the Number bond facts for the <u>Story of 6</u>. So, we are looking at all the different ways that we can make the number 6. To complete this activity, it might be helpful to get something you can use to help you count. So, anything that is small enough for you to pick up and move easily. For example, pens, pencils, dry pasta, small toys etc.

To complete this activity, you will need: -I. 6 objects to help you count. 2. 2 plates. Then explore sharing out your 6 objects, between the 2 plates in lots of different ways and then practise writing your answers as addition sums.
