A verb is also known as a 'doing' word. Verbs describe an action, state or occurrence. Verbs can be used to describe an action - that's doing something. For example, 'jumping':

The rabbit was *jumping* in the field.

They can also be used to describe a state of being - that's feeling something. For example, 'likes':

The monster *likes* rollercoasters.

Or a verb can be used to describe an occurrence - that's something happening. For example, 'became':

The caterpillar *became* a butterfly.

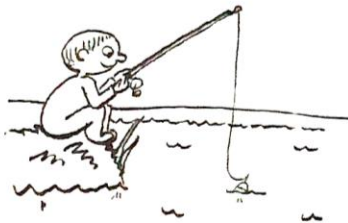

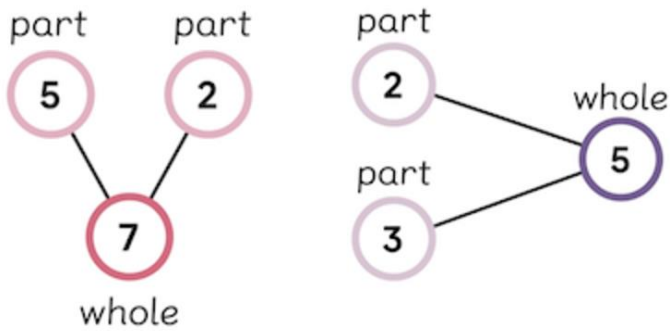

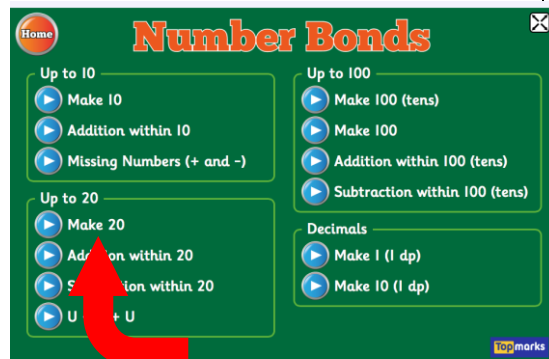
Number bonds are also often referred to as 'number pairs'. They are simply the pairs of numbers that make up a given number for example:






