Presidents of the USA

The president of the United States of America (often shortened to P.O.T.U.S.) is the chief executive of the United States. This means the person who is in charge of the country and Government and can do things like enforce laws, make treaties, appoint judges to courts and make decisions about war. The American president is considered to be one of the most powerful political figures in the world.

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Anybody who's a natural-born citizen, over 35 years old, and a U.S. resident for at least 14 years can become president. You could be president if you were born in another country but both your parents were American citizens. Most importantly, you have to be chosen by the people of America. Every four years there is an election. People vote for one of the candidates running for the presidency. The two main American political parties are the Democratic and Republican Parties. The parties do the following:

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- Select candidates to run for important positions in the US government.
- Keep American citizens informed about what is happening politically in their country, at a local and national level.
- Assist in making decisions about past, present and future rules and regulations (legislature) in the USA.

• Make sure that the political party currently in power (if not their own) is acting in the best interests of all American citizens.

There have been 46 presidents of the U.S. altogether. The first president was George Washington, who took office in 1789. There are currently five living former presidents: Jimmy Carter, Donald Trump, George W. Bush, Bill Clinton and Barack Obama. The most recent death of a former president was the death of George H. W. Bush on November 30, 2018. He was also the most recently serving president to die. Other former presidents include John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, James Monroe, Woodrow Wilson and John F. Kennedy. Abraham Lincoln is a famous president who is known for banning slavery.

All presidents have Vice Presidents. If the president dies or retires between elections, or is otherwise removed from office, usually the Vice President becomes the new acting President.

Abraham Lincoln, James A. Garfield, William McKinley, and John F. Kennedy were assassinated (murdered) while in office. William Henry Harrison, Zachary Taylor, Warren G. Harding, and Franklin Roosevelt died from illness while president. John Tyler was the first Vice President of the United States to become president. Gerald Ford, Richard Nixon's vice president, became president after Nixon resigned (gave up his job). Nixon is the only president to have resigned.

Andrew Johnson, Bill Clinton and Donald Trump are the only presidents to have been impeached. This means their job was taken away from them after doing something wrong. Seller Seller

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The official residence and work place is the White House in Washington, DC. Since 1800, every president has lived here with their family. All former presidents have been male, and if they had a wife she was known as 'the First Lady.' There have been no female presidents.

At all times when the President is travelling, they are protected by Secret Service agents. Sometimes, the president may travel to Camp David (another Presidential house) for either relaxation or to do some work in peace.

On November 3, 2020, Joe Biden was elected to be the 46th president of the United States. He was formally inaugurated (made the President) on January 20, 2021.

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
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
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


Your text can be about anything at all - you could research something interesting and write a short nonfiction text about it.

Topic: An Activity Chosen by YOU! Colours


A couple of weeks ago I asked what you wanted to learn about and lots of you said colour.

British Science Week

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As it is British Science week this week, there will be a science experiment every day! Today's Science Experiment is below:


How to Grow a Rainbow Science Experiment

Did you know that you can grow your own rainbow?

You will need a scientific process called the **capillary action**. This action happens when a liquid moves up through a hollow tube or into a spongy, solid material. It happens when three forces work together: **cohesion**, **adhesion** and **surface tension**.

Water molecules like to stick to each other - this is called **cohesion**. They also like to stick to solids in a process called **adhesion**.

In this experiment, you are going to use kitchen roll. The fibres in kitchen roll have lots of little holes. Water is **absorbed** through the kitchen roll because when the first water molecule **adheres** to it and begins to move upward, it pulls the next water molecule up with it, like a chain.



Words To Learn:

capillary action

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- adhesion
- cohesion
- absorbed

You will need:

- Kitchen roll/paper towel
- Felt-tip pens
- Two small bowls of water
- Paperclip
- Thread

What To Do:

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1. Cut the kitchen roll into the shape of a rainbow.

2. At each end, use the felt-tip pens to colour a rainbow about 2cm up from the bottom. Remember the order of the colours: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, violet.

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Remember the order of the top of the rainbow and tie a piece of thread to it. This 3. Attach the paperclip to the top of the rainbow and tie a piece of thread to it. This will allow you to hold your rainbow.

4. Add water to the two bowls.

5. Hold the rainbow with both ends slightly submerged into each bowl of water and watch your rainbow grow.
