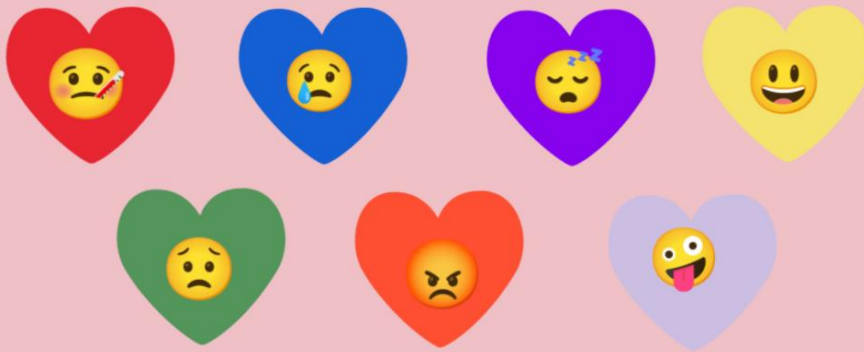

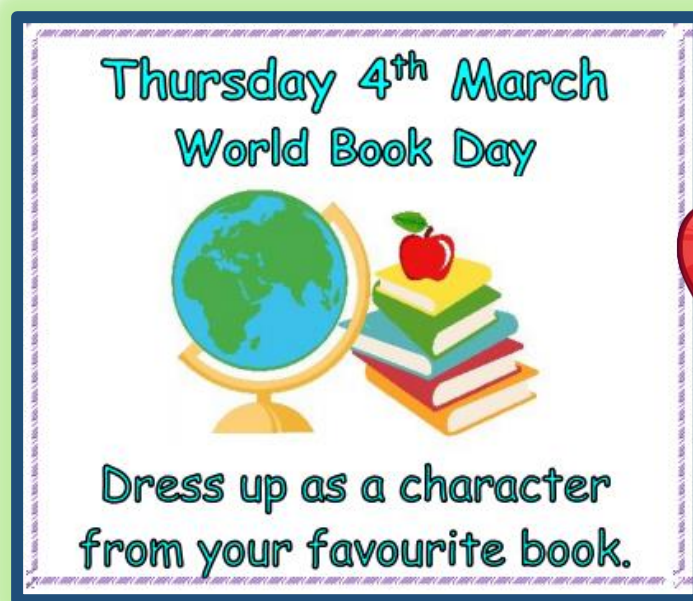

World Book Day

What Is World Book Day?

World Book Day is an annual celebration. This means that it happens every year. In the United Kingdom, World Book Day happens on the first Thursday of March. In other parts of the world, World Book Day always happens on 23rd April.



World Book Day is a charity event. It is a day where everybody gets to focus on reading. Every year, on World Book Day, each child in the UK is given a £1 voucher to spend on a book of their own.

When Did World Book Day Start?

The idea for World Book Day was thought up by a group called UNESCO. They are a group responsible for making sure that everyone around the world gets a chance to learn. In 1995, UNESCO decided to make a day that focused on reading. The very first World Book Day was celebrated around the world in April 1995. It is now celebrated in around 100 different countries.

Did You Know?

- The date of World Book Day changes every year.
- Anyone who loves books can take part in World Book Day.
- You can take your £1 book voucher to any bookshop and swap it for one of the special World Book Day books on offer.

Why Is Reading Important?

Reading is a very important skill and it is something that you will need to be able to do for your whole life. Without being able to read, simple tasks, such as going shopping or reading a letter, become impossible. How will you know what ingredients to put into a cake if you cannot read the recipe? How will you know where the bus goes to if you can't read the sign?

Reading gives you the chance to live your life however you choose but some children are not lucky enough to learn to read at school. World Book Day can be a great chance to raise money for charities, such as Book Aid International. These charities work with children in less fortunate countries. They give them books and teach them to read so that they can do whatever they choose to do in life.

World Book Day



World Book Day is an annual reading celebration. In most countries, it is celebrated each year on the 23rd April. This particular date was chosen as it marks the anniversary of the death of many famous authors, including William Shakespeare and William Wordsworth. However, due to the celebration of St George's Day on the same date, the United Kingdom celebrates World Book Day on the first Thursday of March instead.

World Book Day is a one-day charitable festival, with a focus on books, authors and reading. It is an opportunity for people to share their favourite books with others, explore new texts and learn more about their favourite authors. Every year, on World Book Day, each child in the UK is given a £1 voucher to spend on a book of their choice, in order to encourage a love of reading from an early age.

World Book Day Beginnings

The idea for World Book Day was originally created by an organisation called UNESCO, who are responsible for ensuring that everyone around the world gets a chance to learn. In 1995, UNESCO created an annual celebration of reading. Therefore, the very first World Book Day was held around the world in April of that year. It is now celebrated in around 100 different countries, with UNESCO choosing a different city each year to be the centre of their World Book Day celebrations.

Did You Know?

- 171 million people could be able to free themselves from poverty if they were able to leave school with basic reading skills.
- For every £2 donated on World Book Day, Book Aid International can send a new reading book to a school where children do not have enough books to learn to read.

The Importance of Reading

Reading is a vital lifelong skill. Without being able to read, simple tasks can become practically impossible.

Having the ability to read allows you to access many opportunities to improve your life. However, learning to read is a luxury that some children are not lucky enough to experience. World Book Day can be a great chance to raise money for charities through fancy dress competitions, sponsored reading or whole school collections. Charities such as Book Aid International work with children in less fortunate countries, providing them with books and teaching them how to read, in order to give them the best chance of success in the future.

Religious Education:

P5 Week of 01.03.21

We are continuing to follow our planned Religious and Moral Education Programme. We are now learning about the Christian Festival of Easter.

Lesson 1: Symbol of the cross

The Cross is the symbol of the Crucifixion, not the Resurrection.

The symbol for Christian religions is the cross.

Jesus died on the cross and came back to life on the very first Easter Sunday.

What Happened on Good Friday?



A few days before, Jesus had ridden into Jerusalem on a donkey. The people had rushed into the streets to welcome him. They laid cloaks and palm branches on the ground in front of him and shouted praises to God.

The day before Good Friday, Jesus shared a final meal with his disciples. He knew that there were people in the city who wanted him arrested and that he was going to die.

He also knew that one of his disciples would betray him to the Roman soldiers. After the meal the soldiers came to arrest Jesus.

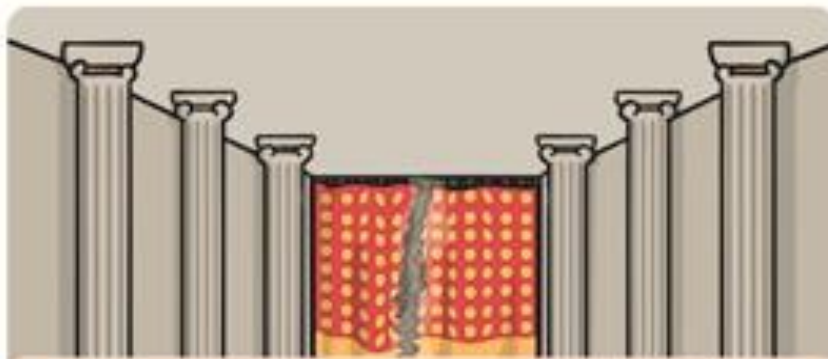
The next day, Friday, Jesus was taken to the Roman Governor, Pontius Pilate. It was his job to decide what would happen to Jesus.

Pontius asked the religious leaders if he should release Jesus, but they shouted, 'No! Crucify him!'



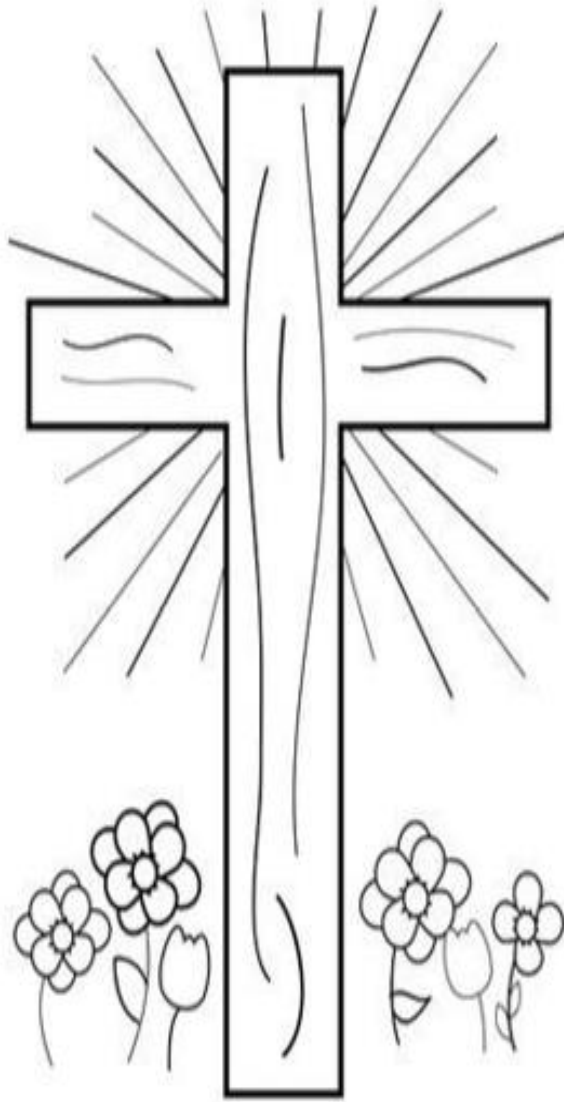

Jesus was made to carry his cross through the city to the place where he was to be crucified. As he carried his cross, he was beaten and mocked by the Roman soldiers. He was forced to wear a crown of thorns that made his head bleed.



Finally, Jesus was nailed to the cross. He was placed between two thieves who were also being crucified. As Jesus was crucified, darkness covered the land. As he died, a curtain in the great temple tore in two.

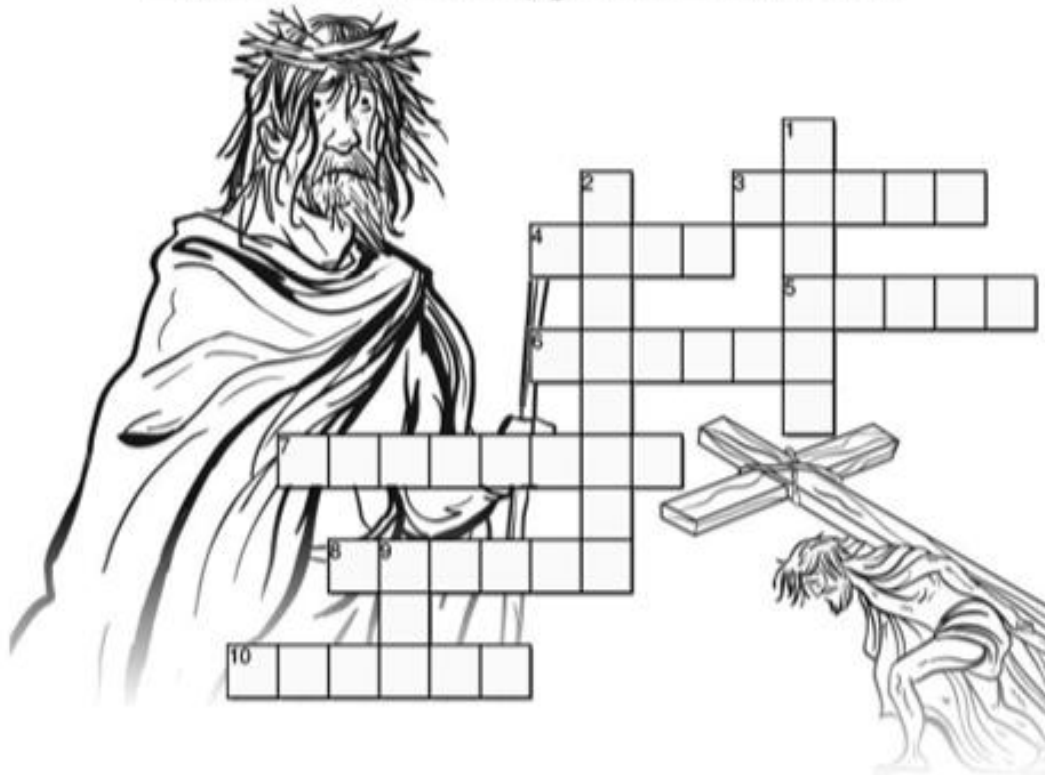
