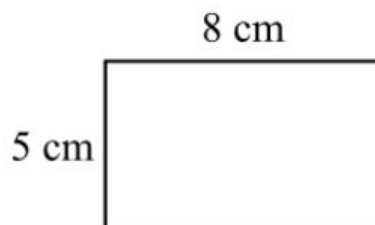
L.I. To calculate the perimeter (distance around the outside) of regular and irregular shapes.
